Every year the PMs have to be updated. The number of fatalities in South Carolina is still over 1,000 per year. FHWA through the Fast Act wants to have PMs to lower the fatality count. The PM matches the statewide PM targets. Most MPO's and COGs adopt the same targets as the state.

I. Georgia Highways

Ellen Wright presented this item:

Columbia County

- **M005753 – SR 383 From North of I-20 to SR 104**
 - Let April 19, 2019
 - All resurfacing activities are complete throughout the project limits
 - Next phase of project will be signal work activities
 - Concrete median and pedestrian crossing poles at Wheeler Rd intersection to be installed

- Wheelchair ramps, permanent striping and rumble strips to be installed
 - Raised pavement markers from Columbia Rd to Washington Rd to be installed
- **0008350 – SR 388 From I-20 to SR 232 - TIA**
 - Widening (1.59 miles)
 - Locals let the project but bid came in over budget.
 - At last contact, Columbia Co. LG working on strategies regarding further funding sources and reduce scope of the project.

Richmond County

- **210327 – I-20 at Savannah River and Augusta Canal**
 - Bridge replacements over the Augusta Canal and Savannah River to include widening (0.65 miles) in Georgia and South Carolina
 - Superior has been issued NTP
 - Based on the Preconstruction meeting held Wednesday, December 4, 2019, sometime next week work will begin on installation of signs, barrier wall, vegetation removal, etc. prior to the early 2020 moratorium on water disruption that is scheduled for March.
 - There should be no major traffic interruption for this work. Some of the barrier wall may be installed during night hours.
- **220680 – SR 4 From Milledgeville Road to Government Street - TIA**
 - Widening (1.59 miles)
 - Clearing and grubbing activities have begun through the project limits and should be completed by close of business December 13, 2019.
 - Utility relocation has been postponed. Work was to start this week but will be rescheduled.
 - Placement of BMP (silt fence installation) is in progress along Northside of project beginning at MLK to end of project.
- **0013927 - SR 4/US 25 BU at Savannah River at South Carolina Line**
 - Bridge Replacement (0.20 miles)
 - Scheduled for let April 2022
 - Concept Team Meeting scheduled at Tennille District Office on January 8, 2020.
 - Cost Estimate - \$34M CONST (2025), \$250,000 ROW (2021), \$1.5 PE (2019)

IV. Best Friend Express

Dana Luttrull presented this item:

LSCOG had a recent December 1, 2019 date for the restart of the Urban 5310 transit program that serves seniors ages 60+ or persons with a disability. New grant funding was awarded by Georgia Department of Human Services and has been made available for expenditure through September 2020. This adds to the existing transit programs available to citizens living in the urbanized service area in Aiken County.

At the last committee meeting Udomekong Udoko presented information on the Transit Asset Management, or TAM, performance requirements to attain/or keep transit vehicle fleets in the country in a “State of Good Repair.” LSCOG is happy to announce that the second of two small bus purchases has been completed since the last discussion. This second new bus has been placed in service and LSCOG is meeting their performance targets in this area.

LSCOG had a successful submission of our annual National Transit Database (NTD) report for transit data of the Best Friend Express, Dial-a-Ride, and Urban 5310 programs. State of Good Repair/TAM performance targets are now reported in this database, as well.

The Best Friend Express is currently in the middle of its annual, and well received, promotion called “Free Fare Fridays.” It is designed to provide a free ride once a week during the holiday season, as well as on Veteran’s Day.

V. Augusta Regional Airport

Greg Larsen presented this item:

Augusta Regional Airport is seeing an increase in the service to Dallas TX. Direct flights to Washington, DC will commence in 2020. The inaugural flight will be on January 7, 2020.

III. Old Business

A. TAP FY 2020 Call For Projects - James Brown Boulevard Streetscape - Phase IV (CAC, TCC & PC Vote)

Carla Delaney presented this item:

The MPO’s concern is the requested amount being more than the amount of available funds (\$650,000 over budget).

David Mills: SPLOST 8 funds have been directed from the Administrator’s office. If the vote fails, the City of Augusta has agreed to find other funding. The funding source is not clear at this moment but the Administrator’s office will find the \$650,000 match.

Carla Delaney: The staff recommendation is due to the timing and funding security, the project should be applied for during the FY 2021 TAP Call for Projects. This way the project’s start date can line up with the Transportation Investment Act (TIA) vote.

Robert Sherman motioned to table this agenda item until the February 12, 2020 TCC & CAC Committee meeting and Gary Bunker seconded. The motion was unanimously approved.

Introduction to the Purpose and Function of a Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO)

February 12, 2020



What is an MPO?

- A transportation policy-making and planning body with representatives of local, state and federal government and transportation authorities
- Required in urbanized areas of 50,000+
- Ensures that federal spending on transportation occurs through a comprehensive, cooperative and continuing (3-C) process
- Variety of organizational arrangements - “hosted” by another agency; stand-alone; existing agency designated as MPO

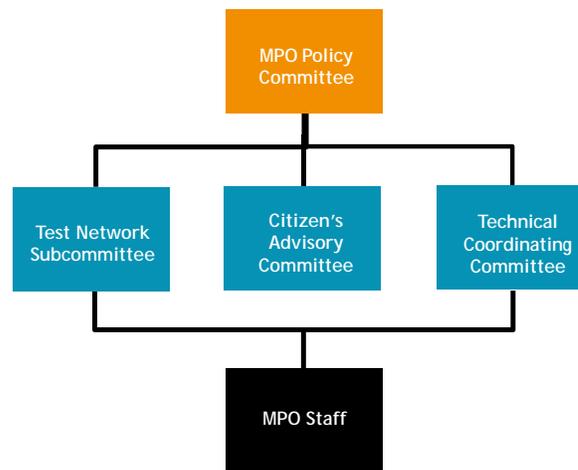


Why an MPO?

- Transportation investment means allocating scarce transportation funding resources appropriately
- Planning needs to reflect the region's shared vision for its future
- Requires a comprehensive examination of the region's future and investment alternatives
- MPO facilitates collaboration of governments, interested parties and residents



"Typical" MPO Structure





Who sits on the MPO?

- The MPO Policy Committee is identified in the documents that designate the MPO
- Membership is determined by agreement among the Governor(s) and units of general purpose local government that represent 75% of the metropolitan area population



Policy Committee

- Role of the Policy Committee
 - Develop a regional vision
 - Establish regional policy
 - Adopt UPWP, MTP, and TIP
 - Ensure that the decisions reflect the concerns of residents of the region



Technical Coordinating Committee

- **Role of the Technical Coordinating Committee**
 - Advisory body to the MPO Policy Committee for transportation issues, primarily technical in nature
 - Oversees MPO technical work and develops recommendations on projects and programs for Policy Committee consideration



Citizens Advisory Committee

- **Role of the Citizens Advisory Committee**
 - Advisory body to the MPO Policy Committee on public concerns and opinions regarding the ARTS study findings and recommendations
 - Provide a forum to obtain public views on transportation issues and problems and directing issues of public concern to the attention of the Policy Committee or the Technical Coordinating Committee

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Project Description

Phase III of the James Brown Boulevard Streetscape project involves demolishing old and constructing new sidewalks and adding streetscape features from Twiggs Street to Laney Walker Boulevard. This streetscape project will incorporate brick accents into the new concrete sidewalk, add street trees and street lights, and provide minimal streetscape furnishings.

Specifically, this work will include the demolition and replacement of sidewalks along the east side of James Brown Boulevard from the proposed roundabout at Twiggs Street to Laney Walker Boulevard. Ideally the streetscape project would include both sides of this corridor; however, due to the right-of-way constraints and potential utility relocations on the west side of James Brown Boulevard it is monetarily feasible only to include the east side at this time. The new sidewalk will be a concrete sidewalk with brick accents at street lights, corner aprons, and tree wells. Existing curb and gutter will be removed and replaced, increasing the shoulder width to improve pedestrian facilities and provide a wider tree lawn for streetscaping elements. The area between the sidewalk and back of curb will be landscaped with street trees and sod. Minimal streetscape furnishings, specifically decorative trash receptacles and light poles, will also be provided within this area to mirror the aesthetic finish of previous and ongoing enhancements to James Brown Boulevard. With all of the improvements, the corridor will also be brought up to compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.

This letter serves as support for the Downtown Development Authority TAP Grant Application for Streetscape Improvements on James Brown Blvd. from Twiggs Circle to Laney-Walker Blvd.

Phase I and II of the Twiggs Circle development are currently under construction. Phase I includes 40 senior living units (duplexes and single family homes) and Phase II includes 23 single family homes (mostly new, some restored), with a commercial mixed-use facility and green space planned for future phases. The project is bound by Wrightsboro Road, James Brown Blvd., Twiggs Street, and Picquet Avenue. The current economic investment in this redevelopment node is projected to be well over \$12 million.

Infrastructure improvements are vitally important to the success of this project. New sidewalks will provide walkability and street lighting will enhance the sense of safety important to urban dwellers. The Augusta Engineering Department expects to begin construction on traffic roundabouts at Twiggs Circle and James Brown Blvd. in February 2015, and the Master Plan for the Cultural Heritage Trail is almost complete. The Trail allows for connections in and around the community and a celebration of cultural milestones. The Trail also includes a proposed section in this grant application known as "Heritage Trace /James Brown Journey".

In closing, this grant application will leverage potential funding sources and attract new development as well. When outside developers see a city investing in its future, they are likely to invest as well.

Augusta Tomorrow is considered to be the “keeper of the vision” and implementer with the City of Augusta of master plans for downtown Augusta starting with the 1982 Master Plan. We are currently working with the City to implement *The Westabout Vision* Urban Area Master Plan which was unveiled in 2009.

The 2009 Master Plan includes the revitalization of the Laney-Walker/Bethlehem Neighborhood as an important part of the regeneration of Augusta’s urban core. The Augusta Housing and Community Development Department has developed an overall plan for the area and much hard work has occurred leading to new and renovated housing stock in Heritage Pine, the flagship development in the overall revitalization of Laney Walker/Bethlehem. Ground breaking for the next phase of development, Twiggs Circle, took place in Augusta 2014. One of the first construction projects is a \$4.6 million public housing neighborhood project funded by the Augusta Housing Authority for 16 duplex units and 8 single-family homes. This project will have a tremendous impact to the south end of James Brown Boulevard.

Beautification and infrastructure needs are important to the success of any new development in our city center. The Downtown Development Authority has completed many streetscape and beautification projects with their SPLOST V and SPLOST VI allotments and was successful with the award of two GDOT Transportation Enhancement Grants that will transform James Brown Boulevard from Jones Street to Barnes Street. A TAP award for streetscape improvements would augment the Downtown Development Authority’s ability to continue their streetscape improvements efforts to James Brown Boulevard.

Augusta Tomorrow supports the Downtown Development Authority’s TAP application for streetscape improvements on James Brown Boulevard from Twiggs Circle to Laney-Walker Boulevard.

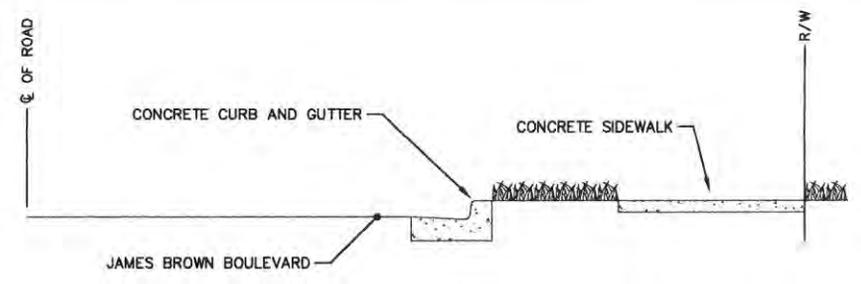

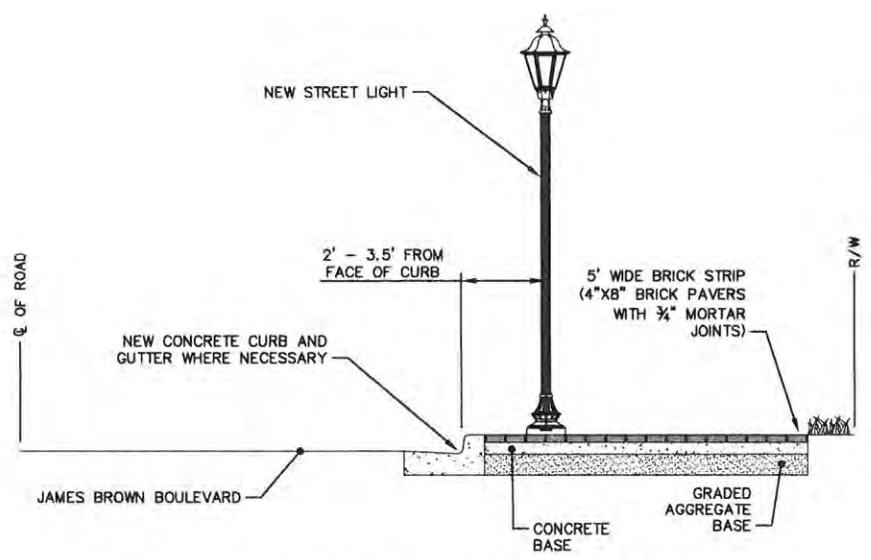




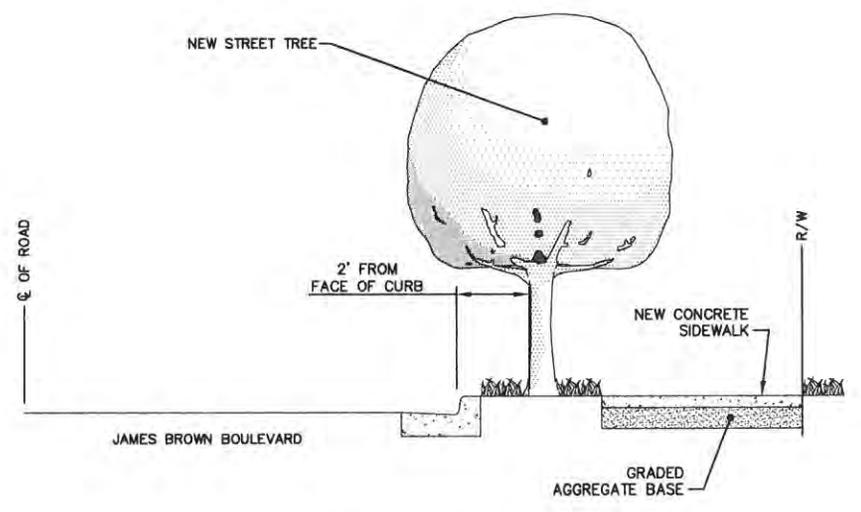

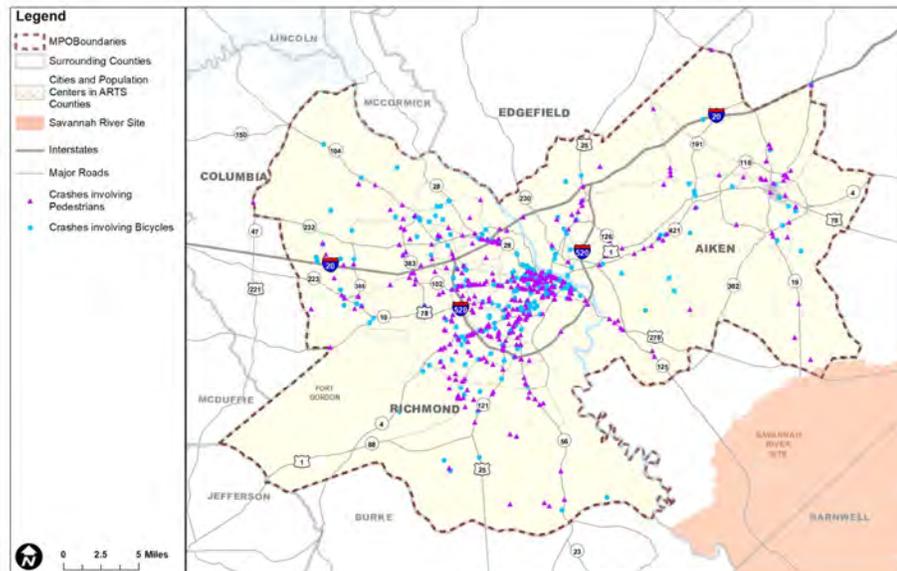
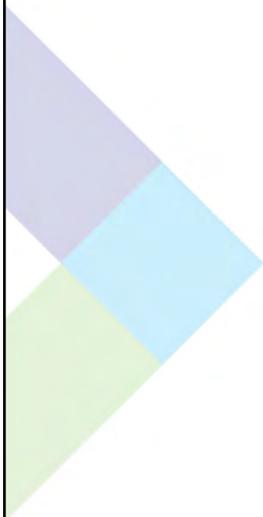
Level of Service (LOS) of Roadways - 2015

Bicycle and Pedestrian Crash Locations

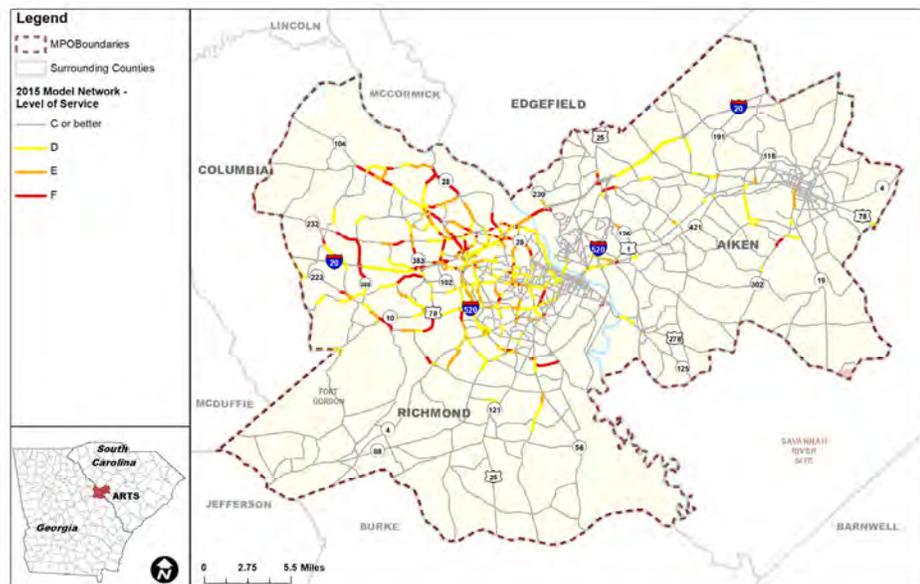

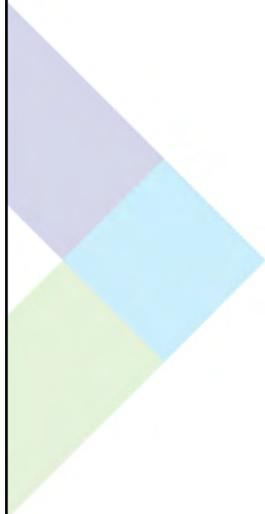
Level of Service (LOS) of Roadways - 2015

TASK 4.6.5 – Transportation Hub Accessibility and Land Travel Patterns in the ARTS Planning Area

Purpose: To analyze the impact of surface access and land travel patterns on the patronage of Augusta Regional Airport (AGS), the largest commercial airport in the ARTS planning area. With projected exponential population growth, increasing household incomes (Columbia County ranked #5 in Household median income in Georgia)¹ and consolidation of the Fort Gordon Military Base, US Cyber Command and Savannah River Site, such an assessment will complement proposed surface accessibility improvements in the ARTS planning area resulting from the updated MTP.

The proposed analysis will take into account Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT), crash potential (i.e., accident exposure), environmental impacts, accessibility, parking charges, and travel costs, etc., by travelers who opt to use competing airports outside the ARTS planning area. Such travel if it continues to grow, wastes finite resources (given AGS accessibility) and puts undue stress on multimodal systems at these alternative airports of choice. Furthermore, it dampens the economic impact of AGS as a regional transportation hub and mitigates desired performance-based planning outcomes of multimodal transportation systems in the ARTS planning area.

Determining surface access and land travel patterns will be in the context of estimating the true cost of air travel by residents and visitors in the ARTS planning area. An understanding of the true costs has the potential to influence increased patronage of AGS given its accessibility and convenience when compared to hubs outside of the ARTS planning area. An understanding of land travel patterns will complement outputs from the ARTS Travel Demand Model (TDM). This analysis also offers a unique opportunity to develop a study template for other Georgia MPOs that have regional transportation hubs challenged by similar yet competing facilities outside their jurisdictions.

TASK 4.6.6 – US1 Corridor Pedestrian Fatalities Analysis

Purpose: According to the 2019 Dangerous by Design Report (published by Smart Growth America) Augusta-Richmond County MSA ranks 20th (of the top 100 Metropolitan Statistical Areas Pedestrian Danger Index) as the most dangerous metro area for walking in the US.² SR1, which runs through the county, accounted 13 pedestrian fatalities (~20% of the 67 pedestrian fatalities for Richmond County) during 2008-2017, approximately one (1) per year. What factors may be at play influencing the high rate of pedestrian fatalities along this multilane highway that transects urban neighborhoods and light industrial zones in Augusta-Richmond County.

The study’s primary goal is to gain a deeper understanding as to the causes and risks to pedestrians crossing US1 in Richmond County (Gordon Highway from GA/SC state line through Deans Bridge Rd to Jefferson County line). Information that may guide the deployment of effective ‘evidence based’ safety measures and improve crossing needs awareness whilst decreasing pedestrian fatalities. Ensuring study goals are met a collaborative approach with the City of Augusta Engineering Department, Richmond County Sheriff Department and Georgia Bureau of Investigation will be sought.

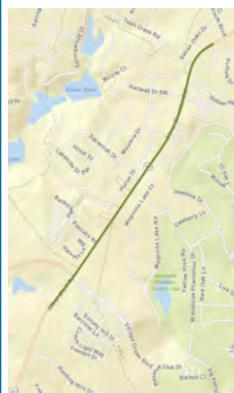
